Harry Quick Last month's speaker was Harry Quick, a retired teacher and federal politician. Harry was a leading person in the Headstone Project in Tasmania, which undertook to provide much deserved acknowledgement for the many returned veterans in unmarked graves. Harry both moved and interested us in his description of the conflict these young men were involved in and the situation they faced on their return home. His passion for, and commitment to this worthwhile project were evident throughout his presentation which was well received by our members.

Harry was presented with our usual token of appreciation and drew Rob Brand as the member recipient for September.

This month's Guest Speaker is Melvin Freestone.

Who is Melvin Freestone?

Melvin migrated with his family to Australia from Ireland in 1977. After extensive work in education at federal and state levels he retired in 2008 as principal of Montagu Bay Primary School. Since that time Melvin has worked in a voluntary capacity assisting educational initiatives in India, Nepal, Thailand, Brunei and the United States. In Tasmania he was President and founding member of Project Hahn Inc. which ran wilderness therapy programs for young people who were 'at risk' or disadvantaged.

Melvin has written numerous educational resources including the full-length books – A Practical Guide to Technology – from pigs to optical fibres, and Thinking for Understanding. Moriarty's Super Gene was his first venture into the field of fiction. Moriarty's Flight of Fancy – is a sequel and part of a series he is writing.

Walking into the bar, Mike said to Charlie the bartender, 'Pour me a stiff one - just had another fight with the little woman.'


'Oh yeah?' said Charlie, 'And how did this one end?'
