<u>Guest Speaker August 2014 Meeting:</u> Following a "Fill in" bio by member Ian Lewis – thank you Ian.



August 2014 Guest Speaker was Dr Bruce Rosen, Adjunct Researcher, School of Humanities, University of Tasmania. Topic... "Murder most Foul"....Dark Deeds at Point Puer, Port Arthur, Van Diemen's Land.

The dreadful Point Puer was used to separate young from old convicts. Children as young as 9 years of age were regarded as "deprayed felons"

Dr Rosen's story surrounded life of young convicts at Point Puer which consisted of mainly boat building. The Head Teacher thought life there was too soft and too much time was wasted in play. Some punishments were strikes on the buttocks or solitary confinement or very occasionally just a verbal comment. Main overseers

were from the Port Arthur prison and they were frequently accused of sexually abusing the boy prisoners.

There was a main jail and 3 sub-jails, used depending on boys behaviour. Boys were known to "crown" warders as a night revenge. Code of silence or alternatively lies applied when "Crowning" was being investigated. Hugh McGuire was an overseer-farm labourer. He was a poacher. Tried in Edinburgh and sentenced to transportation for 14 years. He was probably intelligent. Recorded as well behaved on voyage and no record in Australia of any breach. He could read and write and was listed as not catholic. In March 1843 he was made overseer at Point Puer. He was regarded as kind and considerate to Point Puer boys. He was murdered in front of 27 boys in June 1843.

Harper "broom-handle" Nichol was a suspect.

Subsequently, Sparks and Campbell, 14-16 year olds were also suspects. They were housebreakers and regarded as very bad/incorrigible and bullies.

There was no evidence of blood on the boys or their clothes and both boys were in a group in a ward(cell). Fletcher evidence accused S&C. Flogging threatened by Capt Errington if other witnesses did not come forward. Smith then came forward as a further witness saying that he did not come forward previously as he did want to be labelled a "Dog".

The dying McGuire said before dying that Campbell & Sparks were the attackers. He did not offer any elaboration.

Defence counsel for Nichol argued lack of evidence and of motive and of weapons appearing long after the event.

Code of conduct suggested lying and conclusion especially as accused was not regarded as dangerous or of misbehaving generally.

Jury took 5 minutes to return "not guilty"

Campbell was set free 1849. Subsequently charged in Oatlands and sentenced to ten years.

Sparks was charged at age 16, endured various floggings and was released in 1845. He was tried in 1847 in Launceston and sentenced for 2 years. Upon release was sentenced at Richmond to further imprisonment

Overall, whilst a rattling good yarn told most expertly, it also drew a strong word picture of the prison and justice systems in Tasmania in times past.

A vote of thanks, carried enthusiastically by all, was moved by David Blackburn who also presented Dr Rosen with a suitable bottle of wine.
