Don't let Covid rain on your parade!





TALL TALES BUT TRUE FROM KING ISLAND



SAY CHEESE

King Island cheese, that is!

Sixteen intrepid Probus travellers departed on 1st February flying Sharp Airlines to visit King Island for five days. The King Island Historical museum at Currie was most interesting, giving an insight into the life and times of people who lived on the island after it was discovered in1798. The history of the 140 shipwrecks that occurred before the four lighthouses were built on the island and the life of the descendants of people that survived these terrible ordeals were fascinating.

Four seasons in one day and strong winds gave us amazing scenes of crashing waves onto the jagged rocks. Jet propelled clouds scudded across leaden skies and displayed the occasional rainbow. Then in the evening, hardly any wind and golden sunsets.

The brewery, gin distillery, kelp and cheese industries were most interesting, along with a visit to a farm where the black Angus cows were giving birth to their calves. One calf, only a few days old, was trying desperately to get back into the paddock,

as we were driving up the road. The farmer who was with us on the bus, got out and lifted it over the fence, where among all the other cattle, it was able to detect its mothers call and seeing the two of them finally united together, all of us on the bus gave a great cheer and sigh of relief.

A short walk to the calcified forest was amazing. Once coastal vegetation, the roots have calcified, then the surrounding sand having been blown away by the fierce winds, exposed the weird limestone features. For those interested in golf there are three golf courses on the Island. A lunch at Cape Wickham golf links was the most spectacular with surrounding ocean views and the Cape Wickham Lighthouse, Australia's tallest lighthouse, a prominent feature on the hillside.

The meals definitely filled the spot, King Island beef steaks highly recommended as were the morning and afternoon teas at picnic spots dotted around the island. Cakes and scones with cream and jam never ceased to amaze. Meeting the local people and hearing their stories was so interesting.

Thanks go to Frank and Mike for organising a great tour. Lots of photos on the Probus website thanks to Brian, give an idea of the fun and activities we had.

Our park hosts Pete and Bev joined us for predinner drinks on Friday evening where we thanked them for a wonderful week that shot by all too quickly.


The week was obviously enjoyed as most booked their site or cabin for 2024 when handing in their keys. - NB
