

Our dear absent friend BRIAN GALLAGHER was visited recently by our Welfare Officer Brian Butler who reports:



June Presentation - Brian Stafford

WINDSHIPS – TALL TALES OF TALL SHIPS





BRIAN STAFFORD presented the outstanding story of the sailing ships from the golden age of sail, during the one hundred years following the defeat of Napoleon in 1815.

It was a time of substantial technical and design innovation as the first to get their goods to port received the highest price.

We were surprised to know that the sailing ships remained competitive well into the age of steam ships.

The high point in sailing ship development was the US clipper ships, with the fastest ever clipper being the *Sovereign of the Seas* which could reach the amazing speed of 22 knots. This is in the order of the Super Maxi speeds that sail the Sydney to Hobart race.

If you would like to know more about this fascinating story, Brian has written a book entitled 'The Great Windships'.

July Presentation - Dr Kelsie Raspin

PROSTATE CANCER THE LATEST RESEARCH FROM THE MENZIES INSTITUTE

Dr Kelsie Raspin is a Postdoctoral Research Fellow in Cancer Genetics at the Menzies Institute for Medical Research. Her research aims to address a critical gap in our understanding of genetic changes that contribute to prostate cancer development and its progression to metastatic disease. Currently, this gap in our knowledge presents as a significant barrier to the integration of genetics and personalised medicine into clinical care pathways for prostate cancer patients. Kelsie is passionate about bringing equitable access to genomic innovation to clinical cancer care, and aims to improve health outcomes for all Tasmanians.

Richard is looking forward to giving us all a very warm welcome. - David Brammall



We also enjoy a delicious lunch before visiting the nearby Clifford Honey Farm and finally we head to Emu Bay Lavender Farm to enjoy an interesting talk and pick up some goods before arriving and settling into our accommodation for the next 2 nights in Kingscote.

Day 3 -Sunday 10th March 2024

Kangaroo Island has an abundance of incredible wildlife and today we have a chance to get up close and personal. Our local guide will join us on the coach today as we travel to the famous Seal Bay. We will be taken into the heart of the colony where our experienced guide will teach us about the wonderful Australian Sea Lions. There is nowhere else in the world where you can listen to an expert give you their unique insight while walking amongst the colony. At Raptor Domain, we witness the interactive and inspiring Birds of Prey Demonstration before exploring Flinders Chase National Park. The park's coastal scenery includes Admirals Arch, Remarkable Rocks and an excellent boardwalk where we see a colony of New Zealand Fur Seals below. What a day of truly exceptional wildlife experiences!

Day 4 - Monday 11th March 2024 KANGAROO ISLAND TO ADELAIDE

This morning we venture to the most eastern most point of the island and visit the Cape Willoughby Lighthouse. Being the first lighthouse to be built in South Australia it has a rich maritime history and spectacular panoramic views across Backstairs Passage from the top of the lighthouse. There are 101 steps to navigate to the top if you wish, but the view from the ground is also pretty with excellent views of the remote island coastline. Our majestic views don't end here as we head to Penneshaw for lunch at the Penneshaw Hotel before we make our way to connect with our ferry service to back to Cape Jervis. Once back on the mainland, we travel via the South Vales Wine Region and arrive in Adelaide to check into our Hotel for the next 2 nights.

Day 5 – Tuesday 12th March 2024

Today we head for the Murray River and the town of Murray Bridge, which is just over 1 hours drive from Adelaide. On arrival we board the Captain Proud Paddleboat for a 1-hour morning tea cruise on the Murray River. The high-water levels on the Murray River in recent months should make for an interesting cruise. Heading back to Adelaide we stop in the small town of Hahndorf for some free time to purchase lunch and look through the many shops. Hahndorf has a distinct German feel, mainly as its one of the oldest German settlements in Australia. This afternoon we take in the views of Adelaide at the Mount Lofty lookout and here you can see all the way out to the Gulf St. Vincent and the Adelaide Plains to the North and South.
